

Lesson Plan: *Dear Altadena*

Introduction:

Dear Altadena is a public art project organized by a collective of graduate students in a digital activism course at the University of Southern California's School of Cinematic Arts. The project involves collecting postcards that are written to the future of Altadena and collected as a time capsule in remembrance of the Eaton fire, for its upcoming first anniversary. This lesson plan provides a version of the project suitable for K-12 classrooms with linked resources and discussion questions.

Activity Age Group: K-12 (flexible)

Objectives/Learning Goals:

- Students will articulate their vision of the past and/or future of Altadena, from a combination of personal experience and historical research
- Students will communicate this vision in postcard form, using a combination of visual design and writing
- Students will participate in a collaborative archiving and publishing effort, either by submitting their work to the project's public website or creating their own time capsule as a class

Materials Needed:

- Printed copies of the postcard templates provided at the link above
- Colored pencils, markers, and assorted art and writing supplies
- Camera/scanner and computer for upload (optional)

Lesson Procedures:

- 1) Print out copies of the postcard templates provided at the link above
- 2) OPTIONAL: Have students explore the Altadena Historical Society website prior to designing the cards and choose one published material/story/etc to include on their card
 - a) Grade-appropriate research standards can apply here
- 3) Allow students to choose which of the templates/prompts they would like to complete
- 4) Provide students with art supplies and give them adequate time to complete their postcard

- a) If you have students who want to create their pieces digitally, you may distribute the templates from our website in jpg/png/pdf form
- 5) OPTIONAL: If you would like to share your class's work, feel free to redact any identifying information you deem appropriate to remove, take photos/scans of the completed postcards, and upload them at the submission form linked above!
 - a) As an alternative, if you do not wish to submit your class's work to the project's website, we suggest creating your own "archive"/time capsule as a class that can take any form needed
 - i) Consider: where will the postcards be stored (physically or digitally?); to whom, when, and how will the postcards be available?

Discussion Questions (Tiered by Grade Level):

- Grades K-5:
 - 1) How can understanding the past help us plan for the future?
 - 2) How might we explain the past to someone from the future?
 - 3) How do writing and art help us remember the past?
- Grades 6-8:
 - 1) How does your community remember the past?
 - 2) What can postcards communicate that other modes of writing cannot?
 - 3) What is our role in preserving the past/present for people of the future?
- Grades 9-12:
 - 1) How does evidence function in claims about the past?
 - 2) What is speculative writing?
 - 3) What is an archive? Does a "time capsule" count?
